Parish Council Report

After two Parish Council Meetings and the Annual Village Meeting since my last report, we are able to celebrate some real progress and also some frustration because of lack of it.

The construction of the new path up to the church should have begun by the time you are reading this. We have been promised a start in the last week in May, with work on the traffic calming signs at the entrances to the village to be completed by the end of June. If this does happen, then it will mark the end of a saga which started with the parish being allocated a grant by Rugby Borough Council at the end of 2008 – a good outcome in Jubilee Year!

The Annual Village Meeting on 24 April was attended by around 30 people. It was good to hear reports from twenty organisations involved in village life and heartwarming to hear of so much community activity. The bus shelter sub-committee presented their plans for the replacement of this village landmark, and these were fully endorsed by those attending.

What has been disappointing is the struggle to find funding streams from grant-giving bodies to help us cover the estimated cost of around £5,700 for rebuilding the shelter. While we have not given up on this quest, it is looking increasingly likely that replacing a quirky bus shelter does not fall into the criteria for the usual grant projects. The Parish Council (PC) therefore decided at its May meeting to look at ways of covering the cost within the village. It was resolved that the PC will find 20% of the cost; the Distribution Fund will be asked to agree to a significant contribution (this request will have to be agreed at a special village meeting); an anonymous gift of £500 has already been made by a villager, and the remainder will have to be raised amongst ourselves. If you wish to promise a gift against the possibility of our not finding a grant, please let our Clerk know: (parishclerk@birdingbury.org or tel. 01926 335746).

Jubilee celebration plans are well in hand and the final planning meeting took place on 23 May. As well as Swap Shoppers and other villagers' efforts to make a kilometre of bunting to decorate our streets, a variety of community events has been planned. All we need now is a weekend of sunshine and for villagers to come out to join in the fun, culminating in the Street Party and presentation of Birdingbury jubilee mugs at 4.30 on Tuesday 5^tJune. Thanks to the efforts of Cllr Chris Morton, the mugs are now available, and those who have ordered them will be reminded to make their payments prior to delivery: *cheques payable to Birdingbury Parish Council please*.

The loss of the bus shelter with its attached notice-boards has meant that posting PC notices is rather difficult. For those of you with internet access, notices are always available there: www.birdingbury.org and laminated notices are pinned to the A-boards outside the Birbury.

At their AGM in May the PC agreed to keep to the well-established time-table for meetings, but with a change to the start time. Meetings will be held in the Birbury on the third Tuesday of every month except August and December, *but will start at 7.30 instead of 8.00pm*. It was also agreed *not* to hold a September Village Meeting as the pressure for this had been, in the past, to agree to support for the Birdingbury Festival, and this is no longer relevant.

Please don't hesitate to contact me, the other councillors or the clerk if you would like to discuss any of these or other issues with us. Our details are on the website and on the board outside the Birbury.

BT Infinity

I am pleased to confirm that the village is now wired for BT Infinity through the Marton Exchange. Those who have already signed up to the new packages available from BT have noticed a dramatic increase in speed - at least as good as was promised. In Back Lane for instance we are now receiving up to 70 Mbps. Thanks must go to the small team from our neighbouring villages who have worked so hard with us to secure this massive benefit to Birdingbury.

Heartstart

The Parish Council is asking for your guidance regarding the 'Heartstart' programme for the village.

Heartstart is supported by the local ambulance service. They encourage communities to purchase a defibrillator, which can be used by volunteers should someone suffer a cardiac arrest. There are two supported schemes.

Option One: Community Responders.

Six days' training, over three weekends, is required to achieve a National Certified Standard. This covers the use of the defibrillator together with first aid training. Six or more volunteers are required to participate in a rota and inform Ambulance Control of their availability. They can then be dispatched to medical incidents including cardiac arrest. The defibrillator costs £850, with the Ambulance Service supplying oxygen and other first aid equipment.

Option Two: A defibrillator is secured in a centrally placed cabinet for which a power supply is required. A couple of hours training is provided for volunteers who can respond only to cardiac arrests. When calling 999 the caller MUST state their knowledge of the defibrillator as the call handler can't direct them to it. The defibrillator automatically tells the user what to do and when to do it so is supposed to be foolproof! The cost of the defibrillator and cabinet is approximately £1,500.

NB. In either case there is a four minute 'window' for positive outcomes.

You will see that both options have their limitations and involve great responsibility for the volunteers, with Option 1 also requiring a considerable commitment.

An **Option Three** came out of the village meeting. It was for volunteers to receive First Aid Training, which the Parish Council would attempt to arrange.

estate ...which, would you believe, included 12 farms, all for the bargain price of £30,000. Of course this must have been a great deal of money in 1914! I looked at pictures of the old rickyard before my house was built and it was a working farm right in the middle of the village...just as the farm was where I grew up in Cubbington. All absolutely fascinating and informative into the bargain.

The Group must have worked very hard putting this exhibition together and our thanks go to them. I do hope that they might consider repeating it at some time...so that I can continue on my journey through the years...and those who may have missed it would get another chance. I can thoroughly recommend it to every one of all ages.

Springtime in Birdingbury – The wettest drought yet

You don't need me to tell you the obvious; April and May so far have been very wet. The total rainfall for April in Birdingbury was 140mm while the average of the previous 7 years was 27mm and, amazingly, the total for April 2011 was just 4mm! Up to 10 May, we have had 45mm (thank you Geoffrey and Leslie for the info). The brook that crosses under the Leamington Hastings road (Cruckle Gutter) had hardly any water flow during the winter yet, on a recent walk, I noted it was in full spate. Draycote reservoir

has been exceptionally low: however, it is now filling up to normal end of winter levels.

Another unusual aspect this year has been the late arrival of passerines (a new word to me from the RSPB website). My first sighting of house martins and swallows was about two weeks later than the long term average. Three swifts have been seen recently above the village. Sadly, I still haven't heard a cuckoo, although one has been heard fleetingly from the allotments in early May.



I've read that this is probably due to a loss of habitat at their African wintering sites. It would be a great shame if that's it, and we are to have springs without the iconic sound of cuckoos.

On a brighter note, there has been some great spring birdsong. I am not the only one to have commented on particularly tuneful blackbirds in the village. At Marton Glebe Farm the yellowhammers and skylarks have been in good voice too.

Wild spring flowers seem to have benefited from a soaking. The primroses in the churchyard were good and I'm sure that there are more cowslips than ever.

The rape is in full flower. But I wonder why are we growing so much of it when the market price for wheat is good? On local walks it can seem that half of the arable land is planted with rape. I would have thought that we could more effectively feed the world by growing cereals, like wheat.

In the midst of the devastation that we felt had hit our lives, we found the real value of family, friends and neighbours. We were doubly blessed in that although we have lived in Birdingbury for over 5 years, we lived in Bubbenhall for almost 20 years and it was where Micaela was born 23 years ago. Both communities came to our help in such practical ways; from the natural offer of a shoulder to cry on, to the basics of providing a meal, when the last thing we were capable of doing was cooking. Offers of shopping, driving, phoning, minding, and helping out at our open house, funeral service and reception were just a small part of the overwhelming support we received. And all of these followed by the ever open invitation to come for a cup of tea!

We cannot thank you enough.

As Micaela was baptised in Bubbenhall church we felt it appropriate that she be buried there and, having been welcomed "home" by the bellringers, who too just wanted to do something for her, she now rests in a beautiful, sunny spot in a lovely churchyard. She will always be with us, as will the memories of the kindness and support of the two communities that are helping us through this difficult time.
