Parish Council Report March 2018

After the two recent periods of serious snowy weather, the Parish Council discussed how well the community had coped. We noted the ways in which good Samaritans had looked out for vulnerable neighbours: some collected shopping for those unable to get out; a local farmer cleared a blocked road enabling people to make essential journeys; others got out their spades and cleared snow on paths etc. We thank all of you who helped in these and many other ways. We were, however, disappointed by the way in which lack of co-ordination by some elements of our local councils led to real difficulties for those needing to travel to work. The temporary closure of the roads to Marton led to greatly increased traffic along the diversion routes which had not been gritted. We have taken this up with the highways department of the County Council, requesting that they take steps to ensure that this doesn't happen in future. This highlighted, once again, the issue of Bourton Hill not being on the gritting route.

The granting of planning permission for conversion of the wooden stables in a field off Stockton Road is still causing us concern and we are continuing to pursue this issue with the planning authority, Rugby Borough Council.

At our February meeting we discussed the ongoing problem of fly-tipping along local verges. In addition to reporting incidences of this to RBC, it is also helpful if you can note the registration number of any vehicle you might see causing this nuisance, as this could lead to the culprit receiving a penalty.

We are going to carry out our annual Litter Pick to clear the rubbish which has accumulated on the verges around the village. Hi-Viz jackets and litter picks will be supplied and a warming cuppa will be available in the Birbury at the end, so if you care about your environment, come out and join us on

Saturday 14th April at 10.30 outside the Birbury

If you have a view on any of these or any other issues, do feel free to contact any of the councillors, or the Clerk, or come along to our next meeting, which will be on

Tuesday 17th April 2018 at 19.30 in the Birbury.

The **Annual Village Meeting** will take place the following week, when you will have an opportunity to put questions to your councillors and hear from the wide range of local bodies which make living here so good.

Thin Jethro Lasky

The Bard of Birdingbury

J. Laurence Hart was born in Harborne in 1850 but spent most of his adult life living and working in Warwickshire and had a particular connection with Birdingbury. He was a prolific artist and poet and nature lover, with the rural countryside being his predominant themes in both media. He painted mainly watercolours of landscapes and rural scenes in the impressionist style. At least 90 of his paintings are exhibited in various art galleries in London, Liverpool and Birmingham.

As a young man he was disinherited by his father for turning his back on the Roman Catholic faith and becoming a Protestant preacher. He lived in poverty most of his life, scratching a living from the sale of his poems and pictures. He lodged for a time in Birdingbury at Marston House with Miss Charlotte Perkins, an elderly lady of independent means. His paintings still occasionally come up for sale at auction fetching several thousand pounds.

Particularly relevant to us is the painting he did of Birdingbury Hall in 1885. We are not sure of the current whereabouts of this painting but we do know it was auctioned off in 1914 as part of the estate of Miss Cook of Haseley Villa, Clarendon Avenue, Leamington Spa. The Birdingbury History Group have a full colour copy in our picture archive if you are interested.



Although he painted landscapes and seascapes from around the country, the titles of many of his works reflect his love of our part of Warwickshire. Examples include:

- View of the Leam evening
- A Spring in the Woods- Cubbington
- Warwickshire Canal
- A Warwickshire Ford with Cattle
- The Old Mill, Eathorpe

As well as an artist and poet, he was an eloquent speaker. His friend, J Cumming Walters, said of him: "I remember that on one occasion, he was asked to respond to the toast to literature and art. He at once arose, and poured forth a wealth of beautiful thoughts which simply electrified his audience. The hearers were as if spellbound while sentence after sentence flowed forth with perfect ease, the language always rich and choice, the glimmering image stealing into it, the sentiment elevated, and the apt quotation, introduced without an effort, adding its gleam to the rushing torrent of speech. It was a perfect piece of oratory, delivered in faultless style."

He was a shy, introspective and reserved man and quite reclusive in nature, so he never received the fame and recognition he deserved. He did not seek reward or fame but was content to pursue his study of English literature. He found peace and joy in his later years writing his poetry and painting at his hermit-like retreat in North Wales.

It was here that upon opening one of his old books, he saw the name of Birdingbury that he had pencilled in on the fly leaf. Reflecting on his time in our village, he was inspired to write the following poem;

Birdingbury

Dear spot! Remembrance holds thee yet
So warm and close, thy pencilled name,
Floods all my thought, desire, and aim,
As with a rain of wild regret;
I should but give my love to shame,
Could I forget!

Since when I left thy meadows, set
So softly round thy willowed LeamAnd coppiced haunts, where in a dream
I left a while Life's tare and tret,
Myself now changed - thy wood and stream
Could I forget!

But thou art far, the sea-deep's fret,
Rolls upward through the troubled night,
And scorneth it with hateful spite,
To mock me that my eyes are wet
With visions of a lost delight,

Could I forget!

As many commentators have observed, his poems are like pictures, creating an atmosphere of nature and the countryside. He takes a scene as it presents itself to the artist's eye and then proceeds to paint it in words.

He died on October 23rd, 1907 at his retreat in North Wales, aged 57.

Steve Edgar helped everyone relax and regroup with some great music, so it was no surprise that the amount raised was doubled in the second half – a total of almost £3.5k!

Road Closures Between Birdingbury and the Straight Mile

Warwickshire County Council proposes to make two Temporary Traffic Orders. The closures are required to facilitate carriageway patching.

- The first order will be to close Bourton Lane, Bourton on Dunsmore, Rugby from the junction with Draycote Road at Bourton, to the junction with Marton Road in Birdingbury. The Order will commence on 9 April 2018 and will last for a period of 18 months, or until the works are completed, whichever is the earlier. However, it is anticipated that the works will be completed by 13 April 2018. An alternative route will be signed and is available via: Frankton Road, Main Street, Marton Road, Birdingbury Road, A423 Oxford Road, B4453 Rugby Road, B4453 Princethorpe Road, Main Street and vice versa.
- The second order will close Main Street, Bourton on Dunsmore, Rugby from the junction with Straight Mile to the junction with Draycote Road at Bourton. The Order will commence on 12 April 2018 and will last for a period of 18 months, or until the works are completed, whichever is the earlier. However, it is anticipated that the works will be completed by 18 April 2018. An alternative route will be signed and is available via: Bourton Lane, Birdingbury Road, Frankton Road, Main Street, Marton Road, Birdingbury Road, A423 Oxford Road, B4453 Rugby Road, B4453 Princethorpe Road and vice versa.

Pedestrian access to the roads to be closed will be maintained at all times. Vehicular access will be maintained where possible.

PLEASE NOTE: The diversions are only suitable for vehicles under 13ft 3in in height due to low bridges on Birdingbury Road and Marton Road.

The Council regrets any inconvenience that may be caused. The team dealing with this Temporary Traffic Order at Warwickshire County Council is County Highways North (Tel: 01926 412515).



WPH Charitable Trust

Local people battling ill health or injury are being urged to apply for financial assistance.

The call comes from the WPH Charitable Trust which was established in 1994. Since then, thousands of people across the area have benefited directly or indirectly from Trust funds, which distributes some £250,000 of financial aid every year.

Individuals and organisations who work towards preventing, relieving and curing ill health are also among those urged to apply. Grants are also given to community and private projects in the area which aim to improve the lives or quality of life of people battling ill health or injury.

Recent grants include £1,500 for a mobility scooter for a 51-year-old mother with mobility problems and £2,000 to a pensioner for a stairlift. Also, £1,500 towards a project teaching people with mental health issues how to cook and eat healthily, and £1,500 towards a recycling social enterprise project which creates volunteering opportunities for people with learning difficulties or disabilities, who may otherwise find it difficult to find employment.

The criteria for eligibility cover a wide range of needs, from research into new technologies to the provision of equipment for personal need. The Trust supports new buildings for hospitals and schools helping with provision of special educational facilities, disabled funding, and access improvements.

David Holt, Chairman of the WPH Charitable Trust trustees, said "Whether your application is for an amount large or small, the aim of the WPH Charitable Trust is to offer financial assistance towards projects and equipment which are of benefit to the lives of people. If you think you may qualify for assistance, the WPH Charitable Trust actively encourages you to get in touch."
