# **Parish Council Report**

After the summer break, the Parish Council met on 15 September, supported by our new Clerk, Rebecca Butcher. She can be contacted by e-mail on the same address as her predecessor: parishclerk@birdingbury.org.

Our first business was receiving reports from councillors and villagers about the recent serious spillage of raw sewage in Main Street. This clearly had a significant impact on a large number of people, and the Council spent some time working out how best to pursue the matter with Severn Trent Water and other local bodies, including the Environment Agency. As I write, we are doing our best to ensure that the health hazard is addressed as a matter of urgency, but also to demand proper remedial action: cleansing of the roads and footpaths; clearing of the drains; following up the apparently illegal action which caused the spillage; and the distribution of information to villagers. We hope to be able to meet senior representatives of the appropriate bodies too.

We received a report from the Bonfire Committee. The PC is now insuring this event and a requirement was to provide training for those involved. Five villagers attended the training in early September and they judged it to be helpful. We shall also be providing safety equipment: a fire extinguisher, fire blankets and first aid kit. The village Bonfire Night will take place on Saturday 7 November; there will be a collection of timber for the fire at the end of October.

Our County Councillor reported on the current discussions at County and Borough level on the question of Warwickshire joining a West Midlands Authority: WCC has decided not to do this. Proposals by the Police Authority to withdraw PCSOs concerned us, as we have been well served by our local officer Helena Seal. We were also reminded of the need to report sightings of ragwort (a weed which can seriously harm horses): the County Council should be informed immediately if you see it on highway verges; landowners are responsible for clearing it themselves.

We discussed the worrying spate of vandalism in the Recreation Field (see separate item opposite). Keeping this facility in good order is one of our most significant responsibilities, and we shall be following up the recommendations from our most recent Annual Inspection over the next few weeks.

Our next meeting will take place in the Birbury at 7.30 on Tuesday 20 October Members of the public are very welcome to attend

## Vandalism in the Recreation Field

Over the long summer holiday period there has been a worrying increase in damage to and vandalism in the children's play area and skate-park. Problems reported include:

- bottles, some of them broken, left on the grass
- graffiti painted on equipment
- water containers (for watering the Jubilee Oak) upset and destroyed
- dog fouling on the grass where children play

The Parish Council has a responsibility to keep this area safe and clean, and while this problem is relatively rare, councillors thought it was important to bring it to your attention. It is accepted that children can get bored over a long holiday, but doing damage to a facility which is highly valued by our young people is not acceptable.

Most of the equipment has been bought and maintained by villagers (including the youngsters who initiated the development of the skate park) by working hard to raise money or obtain grants. It is really sad to see these facilities being damaged. It would be really helpful if all parents and grandparents could instil into the young people the need to look after these facilities and to report any damage they see.

Dog fouling in the recreation field is potentially very dangerous to the health of youngsters playing. It is **not allowed to take any dog on to the field,** and there is a local bye-law to this effect. If you see breaches of this bye-law, please ask the culprit politely not to do bring their dog onto the field and report it to any member of the Parish Council.

# **Energy Warwickshire**

Energy Warwickshire is a group-buying syndicate which aims to reduce the costs of buying heating oil by purchasing in bulk.

Households in rural communities, particularly those that are off the mains gas network, often find that they are paying substantially more for their heating than their urban counterparts. Energy Warwickshire was set up by WRCC in 2012 to help combat this.

Energy Warwickshire collates one group order per month and negotiations then take place with various suppliers to obtain the best price for members. As our membership increases so does our buying power. In August 2015 we secured our lowest ever price of 28.97p per litre, (10.98p per litre less than the market high price) saving members £66.00 on an order of 1000 litres

We have approximately 500 members in Warwickshire who are now benefitting from our cheaper prices.

Energy Warwickshire has a dedicated website which allows members to sign up to use the scheme and place their orders. The site also contains a wealth of information on running a household on heating oil, offers for boiler servicing and quotes from current members on the service they have received.

We also offers discounts on LPG cylinders and have access to very competitive rates for bulk LPG supplies.

#### The Harvest - how it is and how it was

The picture on the front of this edition of *Birdsong* shows a typical modern combine harvester at work. It can harvest about 12 acres an hour. Although there were primitive horse drawn combines in the USA in the nineteenth century they only became common in this country after World War 2. The earliest I remember were drawn by a tractor and cut a swathe les than two metres wide while the cutter of the one in the picture is at least six meters wide. Most of the large modern ones have satellite guidance systems which keep the machine running in straight lines and contain computer displays which tell them how many tonnes they are harvesting at any point in a field and how much they have harvested in a field or by hour.

Two hundred years ago corn was cut with a sickle. A gang of three to five could cut about an acre in a day of ten hours. It was back breaking work as they had to stoop to cut it as close to the ground as possible. They were followed by others who gathered the straw into bundles and tied it with straw bands to make sheaves which were stacked on end 12 or 16 at a time in stooks where it was left to dry before carting it to the barn after a couple of weeks. It still had to be threshed with a flail over the winter though

this was beginning to give way to machine threshing.

During the nineteenth century horse drawn reapers developed and later reaper binders which tied the corn into sheaves but then dropped them on the ground where they had to be picked up and stacked into the stooks. I remem-



ber doing this as a boy in the 40s. Of course by then hand threshing had long gone and been superseded by travelling threshing machines to be in turn superseded by the combine (which *combined* the reaper and thresher).

The biggest modern machines can cost a third of a million pounds. In 1830 when a man was paid 3 shillings or 15p a day (during harvest, much less in winter) the cost of harvesting was 70p per acre. With inflation that's about £65 - today the cost with a combine is about £40 per acre but that includes the threshing and we can grow three times as much wheat per acre.
