Parish Council Report

Our first meeting of the New Year was mostly concerned with various highways and safety issues, which have been taken up with the appropriate authorities – Rugby Borough Council and Warwickshire County Council. We are still waiting for the road safety signs at the entrances to the village to be done. We are promised them for the end of March.

Changes in planning law and local planning policies mean that we should probably update the housing needs and planning aspects of our Parish Plan. We are seeking expert advice on this.

Work on the new bus shelter has continued over the last few weeks – as weather has allowed. We owe a real debt of gratitude to those villagers who have given so generously of their time, money, expertise and effort to this project. We shall be having a formal 'Opening Ceremony' and unveiling of a commemorative plaque in the spring. It will be good to have village noticeboards again, but information will continue to be posted on the village website too.

The increase in our precept (the parish element of your Council Tax) was submitted in early January, and this will result in an increase of around £2 on your annual bill. This does mean we shall continue to cover our annual commitments – Clerk costs, insurance, grass-cutting and the like, and still be able to respond to unforeseen expenses.

On behalf of the Parish Council I wish you all a very happy New Year.

Letter from our Local Police

Between 28 December and 4 January there were three burglaries in the Leam Valley area and one in the Dunchurch/Knightlow area. Access has been gained to the properties by smashing a rear large window or patio door. Due to people being away on holiday it has been difficult to narrow down a time scale but we believe it has happened either early evening once it is dark or overnight.

This was of great concern to the police and all efforts were made to halt the series and apprehend the offenders.

On Friday 4 January an attempt was made by police to stop a vehicle in Rugby for driving offences. A short pursuit ensued as the vehicle failed to stop. Upon stopping

both occupants made off on foot but were apprehended and arrested.

As a result of evidence gathering, the vehicle and its occupants were linked to the series of burglaries in your area. The offenders' homes were searched, their clothing and vehicle seized and they were later interviewed for the offence of burglary and other offences before being recalled to prison.

Enquiries are currently ongoing.

Please continue to encourage your communities to report any matters that appear to them to be suspicious by phoning 101.

Unfortunately, this does not seem to have been the end of the matter as Jackie Morton, our Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinator subsequently circulated:

'Following my email regarding rural burglaries, primarily via patio doors and rear glass doors, two further incidents of this nature have been brought to my attention.

On 8 January there was a burglary in Stretton with access gained through a patio door and on the same evening burglars tried to break in through the patio doors at the farmhouse at the top of Bourton Hill, and when they weren't able to get in that way apparently broke in through the front door.

These people appear to be looking for small valuable items - money, jewellery, laptops, etc.

If you see anything suspicious, please let the police know - or myself - and I can forward it to the RRS team and Helena'.

Birdingbury Village Club

Dear members and villagers,

We as a committee are very proud that we still have a village club. Many licensed premises have failed in recent years but we continue to move forward, with little debt, looking positively to the future. Villages and communities everywhere are faced with losing local amenities which help, like the Church and the Birbury, to meet people's local needs and provide useful facilities. We are determined to play our part.

Our own consultation process together with the feedback that came out of the 'Village Plan' gave us clear guidance on what you wanted:

A comfortable and friendly environment,

Flexible facilities to allow for diverse usage,

Services that will benefit the community, like our Christmas Post Box or, in the future perhaps, Dry Cleaning, Groceries, Post Office?

(Please let us know if you have any other ideas?)

As a result, a sub committee was formed and tasked with forming a plan. We have been talking about refurbishment for a long time so we know we have to start delivering. With some money available following various fundraising events and donations, the next step was to identify what could be done for the money. This is still wholly dependent on volunteers helping the tradesman who give their time for next to nothing. So if any of you would like to burn a few calories or have skills to offer, please, please let me or any of the committee know as we would love to see you.

Two schemes were identified - the toilets and the front aspect of the club. As we eventually intend to refurbish the whole interior there were important technical reasons why we have to complete the toilets first. We felt that the intended work at the front will make the space more attractive and will reflect positively on the club and the village.

Phase One started in December with the refurbishment of the ladies' toilets and that will be completed by the end of January. The work on the gents' toilets follows and will be completed in February. At the same time the work at the front of the club will commence with the clearing of the site. This work won't be completed until the spring, however, as the delay is required for better weather and planting.

When Phase One is complete we will turn our attention to the inside of the club. The level of refurbishment we are able to achieve will depend on the amount of funding we can access. We are committed to redecorating and new furniture, but would ideally wish to make some structural changes to maximise the use of the building.

'It May Come In One Day' or 'The Vikings Are Here!'

A long time ago, in a galaxy far, far, away.... Start again: a long time ago, not long after it began life, the village History Group - the people who brought you the Memorial Inscriptions booklet about inscriptions in St. Leonard's, its church-yard and the village generally; they also brought you that extraordinarily successful Open Day and Display in the Club/Birbury last May – the Group decided that the village needed an archive store. Why? Well, because there are many records which are of interest to people now (as the Open Day showed) and even more which may well be of interest to people in the future.

What sort of records? Biggest by far are the records of the Parish Council (from 1967) and its predecessor, the Parish Meetings (from 1894): as things stand those would fill the equivalent of two four-drawer filing-cabinets. This pile has been carted around from one Parish Council Clerk to another, growing all the time, until we reached the point when it was unfair – maybe impossible – to expect the Clerk to house it. So, it's currently stored in the Chair's garage and loft until a suitable home is found.

This pile needs culling, it's true, but that's not an easy job and would require, if I were doing it, nerves of steel to ignore the maxim which my Mum drilled into me during the war whenever she spied anyone in the family about to chuck something out: 'It may come in one day!'

Doubtless, other records could be slimmed down too: those of the Birbury, the Club, Birdingbury Hall, the Church, Ladies Circle, the Fete/Festival/Country Show, First Homes, Jubilee events, the railway, and so on. But, even if you had a culling team comprising Attila, Dr Beeching and that nice Mr Osborne on the case, you'd still be left with material crying out for appropriate storage.

So the Group, anxious to get on with the job, considered where such a store might be housed. Within a year we'd come to realise that there was only one possibility: the church. Then we needed to consider where the money might come from to pay for cabinets/cupboards/ whatever. We thought that the biggest potential user, and the only village organisation which represents the whole community – i.e. the Parish Council – should be asked. We reckoned that the church would want to invest in the store, too. Finally, we concluded that villagers as a whole, past, present and future, had an interest, so we'd apply to the Village Distribution Fund as an appropriate source.

All three groups readily came on board. The Parochial Church Council agreed to let us have some space up in the church gallery. We were all set!!

O.K. – what kind of store? We spent the next year drawing up plans for a built-in

cupboard in a gallery alcove. We were on the edge of starting when an expert who was helping the church with their proposal to install a toilet, advised that a built-in store would attract damp from the walls. So now we searched for second-hand filing cabinets, until Chris Barney suggested that they wouldn't provide suitable storage and commended, instead, a 'tambour unit' (no – me neither. In fact, I thought it was something to house small drums and suggested Chris should have a lie-down in a darkened room. I should have known better. In fact, office-furniture-wise, it's a cabinet with doors which slide open and shut on grooves within the width of the cabinet, with fittings to house boxes, folders and suspended filing). "You can buy them from Viking Office Supplies," said Chris, "they'll deliver and they'll do all the work!"

Nearly there! Being a careful planner, though, I thought I'd check to make sure that this tambour thingy would go up the church's narrow spiral staircase. No chance whatsoever. Gloom and despond – we'd just have to try to rope-haul it up from the ground, over the balcony pews and into the gallery alcove, probably destroying priceless pew-carvings en route (that last bit's pure fantasy – but the job wouldn't be easy).

Imagine my relief – nay, ecstasy - when Viking told me that tambour units were delivered 'flat-pack-style' and assembled by their warriors! In sight of our goal!! (We were now into year three of the project, by the way).

True to their word, the longship (actually, a van) turned up at the church on Thursday 10 January. Setting aside their shields and swords, my deliverers asked me to show them where I wanted the unit set up. "Can't be done," they said. "It comes in a flat-pack, but to assemble it we need a floor area the size of the larger, rear, face of the cupboard to lay that out on the floor and assemble it from there." The gallery has nowhere near such an area. Despond.

However, after some mental and physical gymnastics and the temporary removal of some priceless, fragile (and probably sacred) church bits and pieces, the two Vikings managed, without benefit of crampons or pitons, to assemble the cupboard by resting it on the tops of the pews up in the gallery, then levering it upright, turning it through 180 degrees and sliding it snugly into the alcove.



Other village sightings have included bullfinches, a green and a lesser spotted woodpecker. Great spotted woodpeckers are already regular visitors to our peanut feeder.

However, first prize must go Ann & Gary who have seen 4 redpolls feeding on rose-bay willow herb seeds in their garden.
