



## **Parish Council Report**

Since my last report there have been some major developments. Filling the casual vacancy resulting from the resignation of Carol Cartwright was finalised at our meeting on 17<sup>th</sup> January with the co-option of **Terry Healey**. The Council was fortunate in attracting two very able and well qualified volunteers: Terry Healey and Simon Whitfield. The Council was split on which of these to co-opt and I was obliged to use my casting vote.

In the same week councillors interviewed two candidates for the post of Clerk (following Carol Pratt's resignation in November) and we appointed **Joanna Bloomfield**. She will take up the role at the beginning of February once her contract is agreed and signed. I will post her contact details as soon as this has been done. We look forward to a more stable Council, once these two newcomers join the team.

Views have been expressed by a number of villagers that speeding and road safety remain a worry. The grant, awarded in 2008 by Rugby Borough Council (RBC), can help us address these concerns, and a Warwickshire County Council officer will be coming to our next meeting in February to give us further advice. The Parish Council has already committed £1,500 to this issue. It is important that we move quickly in accessing the grant, otherwise we may lose it completely.

The destruction by fire of the bus shelter on the night of 6<sup>th</sup>/7<sup>th</sup> January has caused us all anguish: the quirky building had been a gift in 1955 from Mrs Pollock who then owned the Hall, and it has been regularly and lovingly maintained since then. It was not insured so the village faces the challenging task of replacing it, although there are potential funds which could be applied for to help us meet the costs. There is some interest amongst villagers in making the replacement a community project. Councillors would be very happy to hear **your views** about this. We also lost three village noticeboards in the fire and these too will have to be replaced; perhaps we should be looking at a free-standing one. In the interim, we have been offered use of the small noticeboard on the wall of the old village shop, and we will also do what we can at the Birbury. We shall continue to post information, Minutes etc. on the village website (www.birdingbury.org), which is now beginning to be accessed by increasing numbers of villagers.

Continuing concerns by some councillors about the enforcement of the Planning Permission for Birdingbury Estates slip road were expressed and it was agreed to pass these on to RBC.

We were pleased to hear from Cllr Morton that BT Infinity appears to be on track for initiation in March, and I'm sure villagers will welcome this.

The meeting called for the day following the Parish Council meeting to start planning the Queen's Diamond Jubilee celebrations was well attended and a separate report outlining proposals and seeking further volunteers is on Page 4.

#### The Bus Shelter

This village landmark was originally a 'summer house' in the garden of the Hall. It was given to the village by Mrs Pollock who had moved to Birdingbury in the early thirties after the death of her husband, Lt Col Alsagar Pollock. He was a soldier in the Oxford and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry who had been seconded to the Egyptian Army during the First World War.

Originally from Germany, she lived in the Hall until about 1962 when she sold the property to Quinton Hazell and moved to Learnington

The summer house which was sheathed in rough sawn elm boards and had a cedar shingle roof was moved to its new site by the Rugby Rural District Council. Apparently the significant lean, for which it was noted, was present from the time of its re-erection. Was it originally on sloping ground?

On the night of 6th January someone pushed a motorcycle inside and set fire to a rag on the petrol tank. Several villagers saw the fire but were unable to help.

Great efforts were made to find the bronze plaque, pictured on the cover, amongst the ashes but to no avail.

Besides a good place to wait out of the weather it had served as a meeting point for the youth of several generations and even a convenient goal post!

## **BT Infinity and Openreach**

I attended a meeting in Marton shortly before Christmas along with the main campaign team and a number of representatives from BT and Openreach.

Now that nearly 129 kilometres of fibre optic cable and thousands of man hours of input are reaching their conclusion, I am sure residents will have noticed considerable activity along the roads near Birdingbury. This is all good news and our cabling is in, albeit not running. The anticipated date for going live is still March/April 2012, although inclement weather over the next two months may slow this down slightly. The team estimate that more than 85% of the premises to be connected will receive speeds greater than 15Mbps, and most will get a lot more.

If you do want superfast broadband you will need to place an order with your chosen service provider, choose the package you want and sign up to a new contract. You will need a new modem and probably a router as well to enable you to use the higher Infinity speed wirelessly. Setting this up is not a self-install job and you will need a visit from an Openreach engineer to fit a new socket and faceplate to a wall. Not all internet service providers (ISPs) will be providing superfast broadband, and the choice of ISP can be very confusing.

All in all, it's good news and for those of us who rely on the internet we look forward to the launch date.

Every week in this lovely village of Birdingbury, there are dozens of little 'acts of kindness' taking place quietly and efficiently. A group of us got together recently – as is always the way in this village – following a general chat at a social event, to consider how we could add value to all those acts of kindness that already take place, so that everyone has someone they can turn to in time of need. We thought it might be possible to create a village communication 'channel' that could hopefully provide help that anyone in the village could use at any time.

A group of us are happy to put something together; not to take the place of any informal activity already happening but it would mean that any of us could ask for some extra help if needed. Perhaps some of us are unable to get out and about very much and would welcome a lift to an appointment, the supermarket or a local town. Some may like a drive out and a cup of tea, or a visit from a village 'friend' and a chat. Others may be feeling under the weather and don't feel like cooking, or need a dog walking. You may want someone to keep an eye on your home when you are away. We think between us in this village we could cover almost all eventualities.

So what do *you* think – could you offer a hand sometimes for any of the above ideas? Do you feel you could use some help sometimes? Do you think you would feel able to ask for help if it was available?

We would love to hear your thoughts on the principle and practicalities of this plan. You may even like to join our group to help develop the idea. ## **Neighbourhood Watch**

First I would like to thank everyone who attended on 12th January and there is little doubt from the number there (I counted 48 residents) that we are all very concerned with the perceived current level of crime occurring in Birdingbury. I would also like to thank Geoffrey Johnstone for his significant work over the last ten years or so in setting up and running our Neighbourhood Watch.

Our intention through the Neighbourhood Watch group should be to work with our PCSO, Helena Steadman, and the local team to minimise the likelihood of crime in our community. To this end several suggestions were made at the meeting.

#### Within Birdingbury we can:

improve communication direct to a wider list of villagers

reiterate via mobile telephone text any urgent activity (and refer to email for detail)

become Neighbourhood Watch "Buddies" with immediate neighbours, and particularly look out for the elderly and vulnerable

keep our eyes open and share information, especially for anything that we think is unusual

improve security of our own homes and possessions

We can draw on advice from our PCSO Helena Steadman:

PCSO Helena Steadman is happy to visit individuals to advise on home security and crime prevention.

visit the mobile police service scheduled to be outside the Club at 10 am on 17th February and 30th March.

As promised at the meeting I am progressing communication with neighbouring parishes, and I have obtained details of Smartwater - see opposite. My intention is to prepare and issue a plan of the village with details of each area NHW representative and circulate this to each household.

#### **Quarterly local Panel Meetings:-**

These meetings are held at different locations, the next being at 7pm on 14th March at Grandborough Village Hall. These are attended by the police and this is the forum most appropriate for specific questions on activities and trends. Also present are representatives from the County Council and Leam Valley Wards.

## **Leamington Hastings Infants School – 50th Anniversary**

Leamington Hastings is a small infants school and nursery on the road between Dunchurch and Southam. It has a proud tradition of serving the local community, stretching back to 1840 when the first school was opened on the site. The new school was built in 1951 and on Wednesday 16<sup>th</sup> November 2011, it celebrated its 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary with both ceremony and exciting activities.

The Venerable Ian Watson, Archdeacon of Coventry and the local Priest, Revd. Jane Close, officiated at the rededication of the school and a speech of welcome was delivered by the Head Teacher, Mrs Rose Plumbley. "It was a wonderful occasion," enthused Mrs Plumbley "We are so lucky to have such a supportive school community including governors, parents, pupils and local residents, both past and present!"

Amongst previous members of staff who attended the occasion were Miss Bartlett, who was Head Teacher between 1988 and 1993 and Mrs Eckland, Head from 2004 to 2009. A special tribute was paid to a long serving governor when the outdoor classroom on the site was renamed in his honour the 'Dr Alec Parker Building'. Dr Parker served as a governor at Leamington Hastings for 40 years, half of that time as Chairman, and he is still a dedicated supporter of the school.

As the light faded after the rededication ceremony, the children released 50 golden balloons and then the party really began on a playground garlanded with lights and bunting. A barbecue provided the refreshments and music from the decades kept everyone entertained. Children's activities included face painting and making special keepsake boxes and there was even a visit from Sesame Street's own 'Elmo'. An exhibition in the Parish Hall next door displayed school memorabilia going back over the past 100 years, proving especially popular with past pupils and staff who were able to relive happy memories of their own days at the school.

Staff, governors and pupils at the school all received a present of a special anniversary mug, designed by Year 1 pupil Morgan King, to remind them of a very special day. One past pupil commented "It was such a wonderful occasion! The children were so well behaved and sang their school song beautifully. We didn't sing songs like that in my day!"

## A helping hand when you need it

There is a lot to be done when someone dies. Warwickshire County Council's Registration Service has launched a new free service to try and make easier the complicated process of contacting the necessary official departments.

The 'Tell Us Once Service' means a customer can tell the Registrar certain information, and all the other government organisations will be contacted on their behalf. Anyone with a Registrar appointment to register a death can now ask to extend this appointment and take up the 'Tell Us Once Service'. The contact number to book a death registration appointment is 0300 555 0255, lines are open from 8am to 8pm Monday to Friday, and from 9am to 4pm on Saturday.

To take up the 'Tell Us Once Service', the Registrar will need the following information about the person who has died:

- · Their National Insurance number and date of birth
- · Details of any benefits or services they were receiving
- · Their driving licence
- · Their passport or passport number and town/country of birth.

**NB** This service does not contact any private organisations such as banks, private pensions or employers.

## The railroad <u>doesn't</u> run through the middle of our house. A nimbi's perspective on HS2

Following the government's recent decision to give the 'green light' to HS2, alternative route 4 would appear not to be an option. This is good news for us at Marton Glebe Farm and indeed for all of Birdingbury. If the line is ever built it will be too far away to be heard from the village. Another bit of small good news is that the tunnel through Long Itchington Wood [Bascote Heath] will be a bored and not a green tunnel, thus saving the ancient trees.

However, I cannot see how the building of HS2 will benefit local villages. It is unlikely anyone living locally will want to travel to Birmingham to catch a train to London or indeed to join the further extensions north of HS2. The West Coast Main & Chiltern Line are likely to be downgraded in terms of train frequency and speed. It is doubtful that extra investment will be found during the planning for and building of HS2, to upgrade other parts of the rail network. It is crazy that we have such a high percentage of our national network reliant upon ageing diesel trains [evidence Cross Country trains through Leamington & Coventry]. With the gradual decarbonisation of supply, electrification is an increasingly good green option.

I have real doubts about whether it will ever be built, but meantime the future looks a whole lot bleaker for those living in Ladbroke, Offchurch etc.
