Reverend Canon Barbara's letter

“One More Step Along The World I Go”

These are the opening words of a familiar hymn that is often sung at baptisms and weddings. As we progress through life we face many different “steps along the way”, some joyful, some challenging and some sad. Moving on to a different phase in our lives can feel quite scary, because we can often feel unsure in new situations. As a parish priest, I feel that it is a great privilege to be alongside people through the various changes in their life.

At the end of this school summer term many young people will be moving on to another school, leaving school or finishing their education. Here at Knightlow School in Draycote Benefice, there will be a special end of term service when our benefice will give a bible to each year six leaver. It is always a joy to be part of this service, to bless each child who is leaving, and to be part of their transition to secondary school knowing that they are well prepared for this next step in their life.

I write this letter on the day that some of the young people in our benefice are being confirmed. This is a significant day in the life of these young Christians as they make for themselves the promises that their godparents made for them when they were baptised.

Marriage is another significant “step along the world” and it is a particular privilege and a great joy to prepare couples for marriage and to be part of their special day.

Bereavement is of course a sad change in our lives and in our villages we are fortunate that there are usually many friends to support those who have been bereaved.

During these times of change in our lives it is important to realise that God is there with each one of us, we might not always be aware of his presence, but He is always there walking alongside us in our times of joy as well as in our times of sadness and loss.

Please remember that I and others in our churches are always available to pray for you and support you at all stages of your life. Hymns—Food for thought?

Hymns have been an integral part of Anglican worship for many years. Although they aren't essential, they serve to instruct, inform and hopefully enhance worship.

There are over 400 hymns in our own hymn book and, like most churches, we use comparatively few in our services. They are often chosen because of their familiarity and because we enjoy the tune to which they are set.

The content of the hymns we sing is important and fortunately the majority have meaningful and helpful verses. One might say that they are like mini sermons and can affect us quite deeply when real attention is given to them.

Some clergy agonise over sermon preparation every week and feel obliged to 'produce the goods' on every occasion. But why should this demand be made every week? We have four hymns, each tell their own story and present their own challenge (sometimes to the organist too!). They provide wisdom accumulated over many years. Much more use could be made of their content if instead of the sermon, we focussed on the hymn we have sung, or are about to sing, and shared our thoughts on its subject matter. It need be no more than 10-15 minutes.


Why we take the offertory whilst singing a hymn is beyond me! It is the only part of Anglican worship which, in my opinion is demeaned. 'All to save time' so I am told. There are churches that allow for the offering to be placed on a plate as individuals come into church and the offerings later taken to the altar for blessing after singing a hymn. This causes no distraction and enhances worship both of the hymn and the offering.

I know that change is never welcome but without it, where would we be?
