



St. Edmundsbury Cathedral in Bury St. Edmunds



St. Paul's Chapel at Ground Zero, New York

On our recent visit to New York, Aileen and I were drawn into St Paul's Chapel in Manhattan, a small church close to Ground Zero.



When the twin towers of the World Trade Centre collapsed on 11th September in 2001, this nearby church was amazingly undamaged. It swiftly became a temporary sanctuary for firemen and other relief workers as well as survivors

of the terrorist attack. In the days following 9/11 some 5000 volunteers, with various skills, turned up to help. It became an inspiring example of people acting on God's call for us to love our neighbours. Being inside this chapel a few days before the anniversary of 9/11 was a very humbling and moving experience. It feels such a haven of peace and security.

St. Leonard's Church Bells: A man in the belfry

A couple of months ago, quite out of the blue, Dick had a telephone call from a Mr Chris Pickford asking if he could inspect the church bells. He is an archivist and researcher working on the new Pevsner Guide for Warwickshire and part of his remit to update the Birdingbury entry in this guide was to carry out an inspection of the current state of St. Leonard's bells.

Dick and Daphne, who happened to be in church at the time, were treated to Chris climbing up the old wooden ladder in the gallery into the bell chamber and ringing the smaller chiming bell; a sound not heard for some years. He talked them through what he was looking at and what changes there had been in the state of the bells since his last visit in 1974. He also added some new details to his previous piece about the church history and I noted with some pride that our 2009 Memorials booklet was referenced in his 2013 report.

As I was cataloguing the PCC minutes for the Church archive, I noticed that the subject of the restoring the bells has come up on average about once every decade! However the cost of restoration becomes more prohibitive with time.

As I didn't know much about our church bells, the information below which Chris sent to Dick was very enlightening. I had assumed that there was only one bell up in the cupola. How wrong I was! There will be some readers who already know all there is to know about them, so apologies if this applies to you.

In 1552 there were three bells, one of which was probably kept when the church was rebuilt in 1774-5 following a '*competent sum of money*' left for the purpose by Charles Biddulph who died in 1752. Now there is a single ringing bell as well as a small chiming bell.

The Newcombe 1615 ringing bell




This bell, which was cast in Leicester in 1615, is probably the work of Edward Newcombe. It is '*32½ inches*' in diameter and weighs '*6 cwt, 2 qrs, 0 lbs*'. '*The bell retains its canons but has not been quarter turned.*'

(Is there a campanologist out there who understands this terminology?)

This ringing bell has the letters 'ABD, CEF, G, HIK' stamped on it, in addition to the date 1615. (Notice that the 'E' is reversed for some reason).



The Pack and Chapman 1774 chiming bell



This bell was most likely cast by Pack and Chapman at the Whitechapel Foundry in London, who supplied a set of 10 new bells for the old Coventry Cathedral in the same year. This bell is '15¼ inches' wide and weighs '0 cwt. 3 qrs. 0 lbs'.

Many thanks to Chris Pickford for sending a copy of his report for our church records. The text in italics is taken from Chris's report on the Birdingbury bells, 23rd March 2013. We didn't know it at the time but he is the author of "The Steeple, Bells and Ringers of Coventry Cathedral" (1987) and is a well-respected national authority on bells and bell towers.
