It's lovely to see the churchyard looking tidy.

#### Interregnum news

PCC members from Draycote Benefice recently had a meeting with our Archdeacon Missioner, Morris Rodham, to share thoughts and views about our interregnum and

the process of appointing a new Vicar. It was encouraging that around 40 members attended. The real challenges which we have to face can be summarised as:

<u>Affordability</u>: The reality is that we cannot afford a full-time vicar. We believe we could consider a part-time incumbent, but some parishes (including Birdingbury) do not have the income to support this on a medium to long term basis, based on present levels of giving. Our Parish Share would double as we are unlikely to secure a non-stipendiary (self-supporting) Minister as previously. So how do we increase our income?

<u>Growth</u>: How can we enable our church community to flourish? We are thinking about what makes people want to be a part of a worshipping church community and, conversely, what turns them away. We are already working on ideas to create services and activities that are more inclusive and inspiring, that will encourage people of all ages to be involved and committed to St Leonard's. We hope to implement some of these ideas in the near future.

<u>Attraction</u>: How do we make ourselves attractive to a potential clerical candidate? We are looking at our structure and how we can manage ourselves more effectively, in the knowledge that multi-parish benefices are administratively challenging (4 PCCs are a test for anyone!).

The Diocese has indicated its willingness to support our endeavours but we have to show them a creditable plan and evidence of early successes. These are exciting but challenging times for us all. So if you want Birdingbury to have a viable church, please support us and help us to keep it thriving and welcoming for everyone. Small village parish churches are very vulnerable and it would be very sad to see St Leonard's decline.

If you have comments on this, feel you'd like to talk things over or would like to make a financial pledge to support St Leonard's, then do please talk to us.

# Letter from Kevin Downham, Lay Reader in our Benefice

Sitting in the sunshine at this moment suggests that summer may have arrived. But before too long the longest day will be here and then the nights will start drawing in. This period of 'after Trinity' in the churches calendar is the seemingly endless period of 'green' Sundays that merge into Harvest and Advent. The danger is that we become so focused at looking forward, that we fail to value each day.

## The 20th Anniversary of the Ordination of Women to the priesthood

#### Memories of the day from Rev. Jo Stevinson, one of the first women ordained in Coventry Cathedral

The date and place: Saturday, 23rd April, 1994, Coventry Cathedral The occasion: The ordination to the priesthood of 35 women (most of whom had been deacon, and therefore wearing clerical collars, for 7 years)

Finally, we could preside at Holy Communion Services and in God's name bless and forgive people. This joyous celebration was in the Cathedral where we were surrounded by families, friends and parishioners. Symbolically we had walked through ruins into Basil Spence's replacement cathedral and at the end of the service we emerged into sunlight and smiling faces. The following day I presided at the Eucharist for the first time in Leamington Hastings church and then we went to the Village Hall for a splendid buffet meal provided by Maggie Bartmanis and her family. A week later I had the privilege of marrying Dianne Witherford and Mike Powley in St. Leonard's, Birdingbury.

I have been fortunate in my ministry. Most of my time as a priest has been in supposed retirement where John, my husband and my incumbent priest, has always been supportive, along with many of you in Birdingbury and Leamington Hastings. However, I know that some of my contemporaries faced opposition in their parishes. Now it won't be long before the first female bishop is consecrated.

Celebrations of the 20th Anniversary have been high-key, starting with the national festivities in St Paul's Cathedral on 3rd May and then followed a week later by those in Gloucester Cathedral in my diocese. In Winchcombe where John and I live, we celebrated the occasion on the 15th at a service in St Peter's, our local church.

Some friends from Leamington Hastings and Birdingbury who had been most supportive of me at the start of this stage of my ministry, came to share in the Gloucester Celebrations with John and I.

I look back on our time in Birdingbury and Learnington Hastings as the climax of my full-time ministry. Thank you for allowing me the privilege to share in your lives.

Rev. John Stevinson was vicar here and in Learnington Hastings some years ago. Realistically, John and Jo shared their ministry here but Jo was able to take a fuller part once she was ordained into the 'official' priesthood. Many of you will remember that wonderful occasion in Coventry Cathedral. Is it really only 20 years since women have been allowed to be ordained priests? The newly ordained priests in the Cathedral ruins after the 1994 ordination.



# On May 10th 2014 a celebratory service was held in the Cathedral for the 20th anniversary of the ordination of women to the Church Of England priesthood.

Bishop Christopher presided and the celebrant was the Dean of Women's Ministry, Rev. Canon Katrina Scott. Also taking part were representatives from 1994 to 2013, each wearing a stole created for the occasion by the Rev. Naomi Nixon.

Three Roman Catholic women held up the same placards at this 2014 service as at the 1994 ordination: 'Congratulations to C of E women from RC women' and '.... And the women astounded us ....'. Food for thought!
