Well yes, and one or two other small things such as:

receiving and checking all bank statements for the three accounts and making sure everything balances; keeping an in/out ledger with a running balance; issuing receipts for moneys received; bills and requests for reimbursements for miscellaneous purchases for use in church; deciding in which of the categories required by the Diocesan Finance Dept. all incoming/outgoing money should go; sending various letters of thanks; chasing up funeral directors, who can sometimes 'forget' to send the required fees; chasing up uncashed cheques; being involved with the Gift Aid Scheme and keeping records of all donations so that a claim can eventually be made to HMRC; transferring money from bank accounts to a higher interest account but making sure of course there is still enough in the bank to pay our way; setting up of DDIs & SOs for regular payments; adding and subtracting columns of figures, although, of course, these days my trusty computer does it all in the blink of an eye (clever clogs); producing interim balances for PCC meetings and end-of-year accounts ready for examination; sending same to the Independent Examiner and Diocesan Board of Finance.

Originally the accounts were entered in a lovely old Victorian style ledger. All entries were hand written, with the Treasurer sitting on a high stool using a quill pen with light from a single candle. Well OK, this is a slight exaggeration on my part! Of course today my computer really does all the work.

My thanks to our Independent Examiner, Gift Aid secretary, churchwardens and to the late and lovely previous treasurer David Westcott, all of whom have advised and helped me.

So after all not too arduous a job! 15 years later, I'm still adding and subtracting and so on. Does the computer really do all the work?

Letter from Mair Shaw, of Stretton

Recently David and I were fortunate enough to spend five days in Barcelona.

On the first day we visited Antoni Gaudi's life's work, the Sagrada Familia Church. In his words, this wonderful building was built 'by the people for the people'. Inscribed in the basilica are his words, 'God inspires: all we have to be is faithful followers'.

The building's exterior, still to be completed, is quite inspirational. The Nativity façade celebrates the birth of the Messiah, the Son of God made man. It is also referred to as the façade of Life, of Joy, of Christmas. Then the Passion façade represents the pain, the sacrifice and the death of Christ as depicted in the twelve stations of the cross. It faces west and receives the last rays of the sun before darkness falls. Its three entrances are Faith, Hope and Charity. The Glory façade represents the situations of man; his origins, his problems, the roads he must travel and his purpose. Eventually it will have seven columns representing the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit.

Twelve bell towers represent the twelve apostles and when complete, a tower to Mary will rise above these. Towering yet above Mary, a statue of Christ is planned.

In this most magnificent place, Gaudi's very real love of God springs to life as you enter the building. The light pouring in through the beautiful windows, from the blue of water to the reds and golds of glory, onto the simple lines of the church, was for me the most spiritual part of all. Gaudi was a devout man and his love of God bursts forth in that place.

David and I can recommend this wonderful experience to anyone visiting Barcelona. We were left, not just with a feeling of awe and wonder, but with a question. *How much more life could be than most of us make of it?* We cannot all be like Gaudi designing churches or buildings but we all have a part to play in God's Kingdom.

What a wonderful world it would be if everything we did was inspired by God, like the work of Antoni Gaudi. What a world it would be if people could see the light of God pouring out in our communities, our country, our world. What a wonder life could be if we were only prepared, as Gaudi was, to build our lives on something far beyond ourselves, rather than restrict them to the limitations of our own needs and desires.
