Parish Council Report March 2019

With Easter just around the corner and the weather no doubt improving, it is time for our spring litter pick. This year we will be meeting at 10.30am on Saturday 6th April outside The Birbury. The more who help the better, so please come along if you are able.

And thinking of mess being left around the village, the problem of dog fouling footpaths and verges continues! It really is not good enough for dog walkers not to pick up the mess their dogs are creating and that includes the children, if they are being asked to walk family pets. There have, in the past, been calls to name and shame but surely that shouldn't be necessary!

Because of a clash with the Easter holidays, the annual village meeting will drop back to Tuesday 30th April and will, as usual, be held at 7.30 pm in the Birbury. I will again be inviting the representatives of the various associations to give updates, as well as giving one myself on behalf of the Parish Council. It will also be an opportunity for anyone present to raise concerns or ask questions.

Fly tipping continues to blight the lanes around the village and it is now possible to report incidents online, so that the council can organise someone to pick the rubbish up. The address is

The village meeting will be my last as a Parish Councillor, having had the privilege of being Chairman for the last 12 months. So, I would like to thank all the councillors, as well as Jackie our Parish Clerk, for all their hard work.

Dial-a-Ride Bus Service



WRCC is the leading rural community charity in Warwickshire with a mission to tackle disadvantage in, and provide support to, rural Warwickshire communities. First and fore-

most, we do this by delivering cost-effective and efficient community-based support, including our Back and 4th transport services.

I would like to draw your attention to our brand new community bus service which is now available to residents of Birdingbury every Thursday.

The service is called Dial-a-Ride and is aimed at those who struggle to access the conventional transport that is on offer. This could be due to being disabled or elderly and unable to walk to their bus stop, or simply not actually have a bus service in their area.

Dial-a-Ride operates a door-to-door service between 10.00 and 14.30, with full wheel-chair accessibility, low steps and reasonable assistance with boarding and alighting. Passengers call to book their seat and the vehicle will collect them from their door and provide transport into Rugby town area. If passengers hold a concessionary bus pass, they can use this as payment for their travel, so it is completely free for them to use. Otherwise a return fare within the designated zones is £5.00.

Some Effects of WW1 on Our Village

Finding information about Birdingbury's soldiers in WW1 is relatively easy because of official war documentation, both on and off the battlefields. What happened 'back home' wasn't the top priority for reporters and, therefore, it is more difficult to find information about life of a small village like Birdingbury over 100 years ago.

We do have evidence of recorded events in Birdingbury during the 1910s, through local newspaper reports and church registers of burials, baptisms and marriages. For the record: from 1910 to 1919 six Birdingbury men, aged between 24 and 47 years, died on war service. During this same decade there were nine deaths of village residents, whose ages ranged from 27 to 79 years. For the Wall family, death stuck twice in six months: George Wall was killed on war service on 14th April 1918 aged 24 and his father, Matthew, died on 9th October aged 79. One can only speculate whether George's death in some way contributed to that of his father.

Local newspaper articles reported events held in Birdingbury, most of them with the aim of fundraising for war charities. On the face of it, reading these accounts now might give the impression that life here was full of tea parties at the Hall, concerts at Birdingbury School, local dances and so on. But the reality of life in Birdingbury in wartime was not easy! Villagers probably provided mutual support for each other through friends and neighbours. However, there must have been so many personal, unspoken feelings of loneliness, loss, uncertainty and worry. Those at home would have been concerned about members of their family risking their lives in the war, compounded by the lack of contact with them. They must have worried about their jobs and managing finances, as well as taking on the emotional impact on their family at home. They probably wondered about their own future, and that of their children growing up, as well as the unknown length, health and quality of life of their soldiers – and so much more.

Before 1914, we know that women's traditional role was one of domesticity. However WW1 changed all that. We know that some women from this village worked at Nelson's Cement Works near Stockton and others at the Voluntary Aid Detachment Hospital in Southam. Women also worked on local farms too. Bearing in mind that 70% of Birdingbury's male population under 40 had joined up and 11% of the men under 40 died, the emotional impact on those left in Birdingbury must have been huge.

The Leamington Courier reported that, when volunteering to serve in the war became conscription in 1916, Charles Barfoot claimed, and was granted, exemption from military service on the grounds of the hardship that it would cause to his family's smallholding and carrier business.

In a similar case, Frank Cockerill, a stockman and butcher, was granted exemption, but only for two months. There must have been other Birdingbury families in similar situations that had to manage the lack of young, fit people available to work and maintain sufficient income for their households.

How would you have felt if you lived here during this time? What a lot we don't know. There is so much that, sadly, we will we never find out.

Global Care and Shack Schools



You may remember that thanks to a lot of generosity and hard work on behalf of the organisers, a year ago we held a Promises for Auction evening. Amazingly we raised almost £4000.

Now our 3-year benefice commitment to the project is in its final year, with Stretton busy raising at least £1500.

Where do we go from here? I think it's been a mutually beneficial commitment and, if possible, it would be good to continue our partnership. There are several possible ways forward:

We have been invited to join a small team going to the Bekaa Valley this Autumn. I, for one, am keen to go. If it works out, there could be room for about five of us from across the villages. Are you interested? If you want to know more I am happy to have a chat.

The 'Shack Schools' project is winding down and will finish in June 2020, hopefully with local people being able to continue to provide education for the future. Global Care are keen to commit to a new project with The Red Crescent (The Islamic name for The Red Cross), identifying and working with about 100 of the most traumatised and damaged families.

Global Care have a link with a Christian family in a bombed-out Damascus suburb who have somehow stayed and survived. They are keen to work with Global Care providing Homework Clubs, a learning model that Global Care have used elsewhere.

After eight years of immense suffering, the civil war is probably coming to an end and Global Care may be able to provide new kinds of help.

Should we continue to support them and their partners and, if so, what should the emphasis be? Please let me know your thoughts about our future involvement. I can be contacted at dick@special-time.co.uk

The Birbury

The Birbury is our community meeting room. Built in 1986/7 and officially opened on 2nd May 1987, it is separate from, but attached to the Club. It was funded by contributions from many people in the village and beyond and the building work was carried out by local labour, much of it voluntarily.



The Birbury is run as a charitable trust by

a Management Committee made up of three people elected at the Annual General Meeting, plus representatives from user-groups such as the Church, the Club, the Parish Council, the Ladies' Circle and Swap-Shop.

The Secretary is Jackie Westcott and the Treasurer is Alice Munro. This year's Birbury AGM is on Tuesday 23rd April at 7.45pm and everyone is most welcome.

The cost to hire The Birbury is £5 per session (morning, afternoon or evening) or £10 for the whole day. This income doesn't cover its running costs but is supplemented by fund raising events organised by the Committee. The Birbury Committee also organise non-profit making community events throughout the year.

Thank you to Alice for organising this year's Pancake Race and to all the Committee involved in making it such a success.

We hope you will be able to join us for The St George's Lunch on Sunday 28th April at 12 noon.

The Village Distribution Fund.

The Birbury Committee also maintain The Village Distribution Fund. The Fund was set up to "enhance and sustain the community life of Birdingbury and its inhabitants". It "makes grants to groups of people to fund specific assets or one-off activities that support the Fund's goals up to a maximum of £1000 per application (paid against invoices)".

The Fund was fed by a share of profits from Birdingbury Country Festival and donations from The Country Show. The current balance in the Village Distribution Fund is £4137.41. Recent grants have included the cost of the village Christmas tree and support for the pantomime trip organised by the Club.
