Birdingbury Parish Council Report

The Parish Council doesn't tend to meet in December so there tends to be a full intray come the January meeting and that was certainly the case this year.

There are various expenses that need to be paid. We agreed in November not to change the parish precept for the next financial year so will be managing funds within this year's budget level.

There continues to be a steady trickle of planning applications, all of which need to be assessed in the context of the new Local Plan for Rugby. This restricts the possibility of development outside the settlement boundary (an invisible line that broadly follows the 'built up area' of the main village area). The Council's role is to ensure that the decision makers in Rugby are aware of the local context of any proposal.

Even though the grass isn't currently growing, we've been discussing mowing. The cutting of the verges and Recreation Field is one of the main expenses in the Council budget. Looking at the mowing map we noted that some residents cut their own verge even though the Parish contract covers the area. We can't really change the contract based on whether residents choose to mow or not, so we'll discuss this with the contractor.

Speaking of the Recreation Field, last year's audit highlighted that it is showing its age in places. We're continuing to monitor the issues, but if you notice anything worrying please do let us know.



Finally, we've agreed the date of the **Annual Litter Pick** (the official start of Spring!) to clear the rubbish which has accumulated on the verges around the village. Hi-Viz jackets and litter picks will be supplied, and a warming cuppa will be available in the Birbury at the end, so if you care about your environment, come out and join us on

New Year, Good Health, Complementary Therapies

My youngest has been a new born baby and my eldest to date is 92! Bowen can help with a variety of symptoms, such as back, shoulder and muscular issues, and respiratory difficulties, such as hay fever or asthma.

This therapy can also be effective to help relieve everyday stresses and revitalise the whole person. It is about treating the body as a whole and giving it time to get from the sympathetic state (fight and flight) to the parasympathetic state (relaxation and restoration).

People recalled her energy and enthusiasm over the years we had known her: her golf; membership of the Parish Council; the caravan trips she and Derek made all over Europe researching venues for her travel agency business; her love of cars; but, overwhelmingly, her sprit in the face of challenge, pain and sorrow.

The Moores came to Pump Cottage in Main Street after the tragic death of their son, Simon. They both threw themselves into their new community with characteristic energy. Barbara's rheumatoid arthritis meant that she was constantly in pain, but even after Derek's sudden death, she continued to involve herself in the life of the village. With Rhondda Barney she took on the launch of 'Birdsong', using her IT skills to get that unique venture up and running. Right up to her recent long stays in hospital, she was a regular Swap Shopper, always enlivening the proceedings.

Our oldest resident, Bill Cowley, recalled his memory of Barbara on the eve of his departure to war. Living at the pub in Marton, she and her sister Jean went round to say farewell to Bill and gave him a big hug – a typical response from a young girl who grew up into the feisty, spirited lady we shall miss enormously.
