Birdingbury Parish Council Report

The Parish Council met on 21 July by Zoom, our first meeting since March. In normal times, we would have met every month, but these times continue to be 'not normal'. Shops, restaurants and outdoor activities have re-opened but social distancing still applies so the current guidance is that councils might continue to meet virtually until next year.

We had a busy agenda: some of it topical and some of it 'catch up' from the period without meetings. Of the latter items, we discussed our annual budget, having kept the precept (your contribution) level from last year, as well as signing off the returns covering the last financial year. Our thanks to Andrew Armbrister for his auditing duties – much appreciated.

On the topical agenda we had broadband, play equipment and bonfires.

My thanks to Carmel for the energy that she has put into the recent broadband survey (see the results later in Birdsong). The meeting agreed to join the search for solutions, including liaising with local parishes and regional organisations so watch this space.

You might recall that we needed to close the play equipment following government advice about Covid 19. The government has revised these restrictions, so we are able to make the equipment available. Please do read the notices, respect social distancing and remember to take your hand sanitiser with you.



The Council will discuss Bonfire Night again next time, as we'll need to be guided by rules as they are in the Autumn. This is a big night in the Birdingbury calendar, so we are keen to hold it if we can, but it is a lot of work by a small and willing band, so we need to be sure it is the right thing to do. Ideas, and more volunteers, always welcome!

And we discussed the village as a place of work. Many of us have now spent more time working from Birdingbury than working from our 'place of work' in 2020, made possible for some by mobile and broadband signals. We also discussed the workplaces in Birdingbury, like the Club and the Munro Business Park, conscious of the advantages and challenges that come from mixing business and residential. Your Parish Council will do what it can to make this mix work as well as possible.

Finally, despite rumours, we are assured by Cllr Bob Stevens (County Councillor for Southam and surrounding areas) that there are no plans to close the Stockton recycling centre permanently.

Meanwhile, we will continue to supply various items as requested and set up our pop-up shop from time to time.

Many thanks for all your donations of money and items. The village has been very generous in supporting our efforts and this is doubly valuable at a time when all the usual big fundraising events and opportunities have not taken place. This includes our biggest fundraiser the Annual Dog Show.

So far, we have raised over £1200; a staggering total. Pawprints are so grateful for the donations that have come from the village, the money has helped them over the months.

Personally, we have gained enormous pleasure from getting to know people in the village who we never really knew before and from sharing a deeper friendship with people we already knew.

Long may it continue, with or without the threat of Covid19. Thank you!

St. Leonard's Future in Birdingbury Life

Following several months of online worship, we are contemplating a return to church. For some of you that will bring joy, for some, concern. For everyone, it brings questions:

Will it be safe? How will it be different? Why can't we sing? How much have I missed going? Do I want to return?

Our online benefice worship has engaged a small number of Birdingbury villagers, but not many. Our average Sunday attendance is 12-15. It's a long time since any of us were in church for services: it will be different on return and for the foreseeable future. We must be socially distant, there will be no physical contact, no singing, no sharing, limited talking and no fellowship over coffee. Communion will be in one kind (bread) only.

So, I wonder if YOU will return? What have you been doing in lockdown for church? Do you want to return with these changes in place? *How much do you want to go back to church if it's different?*

One thing is certain. If we are to maintain **your** church in **your** village, through Covid-19 and beyond, then it needs **your** support. Not just attending services, but administratively and financially too. We currently have two services a month; our congregation remains stable, but there is no growth in regular worshippers, and hasn't been for several years. We have a few long-standing, dedicated and regular financial givers, but there has been decline in income as well. There is no likely replacement for me as Church Warden when I stand down in April 2021 after 14 years. We are getting older; our PCC now has seven members, five of whom are over 70.

But somehow, I still feel that the church in the community is important to many of you. We know it is valued and we know the work that we do around the village is valued by so many more than just those who attend services.

We are asking for your help and support. If you care about YOUR church in YOUR village, and you want it to remain then: Are you prepared to make a personal commitment to act? What could you do to support and help?

I'm not going to detail a list of jobs, because what we require is more than that. We need people who have a heart for St Leonard's and its place in the hearts and minds of this community. We are asking you to join us in keeping St Leonard's **our** living, breathing, church in **our** wonderful village community. We need a re-think.

That will undoubtedly mean change. That's OK; we expect that and some of us welcome it. Some of us might need to be persuaded. But let's work on it together. Have you seen one of these?

This orange spotted visitor to Birdingbury has been identified by George, a Ranger at Ryton Pools Country Park, as a Scarlet Tiger Moth (Callimorpha Dominika).

It is a day flying moth, seen in flight during warm sunny days in May and June, usually in damp areas such as riverbanks, brooks and streams, damp woodland rides and railway cuttings. The larvae will feed on a range of herbaceous plants, but comfrey is particularly favoured (on which it was sighted in our garden).

Butterfly Conservation Warwickshire say very few sighting records exist in Warwickshire prior to 2006. We have logged our recent sighting with them.

Enduring Hope

The sharp frost on Tuesday, May 12 when the temperature dropped to minus three around dawn, caught lots of us by surprise and blackened leaves in many of our gardens. In more than forty years in the village I have never known this happen to the very fine walnut tree in the garden of Brook Farm House.

That this should take place just a week after the 75th anniversary of VE Day is perhaps significant as the tree was planted in 1945 to celebrate that important event.

At that time the Cockerill family were at Brook Farm, as they had been for about fifty years. Soon after we had moved into the village in 1978, Rhondda and I were told by Gwen Cockerill, who then lived in Longroods, that a little walnut sapling was found on the railway bank on that very important day and transplanted into their garden as a gesture to welcome peace and of hope for the future.

It is now a splendid tree that in some years produces a prodigious crop of walnuts, much to the delight of squirrels and the mild irritation of gardeners, as the little squirrel-sown saplings can be quite hard to pull up. This year, following the frost in May, at the beginning of June it was almost leafless.



However, I am pleased to say that now, in the middle of July, it has grown a new set of leaves and it should be in fine form by the time we get to VJ Day on August 15.

I hope this important memorial can look forward to many more decades of a healthy life to remind us of the end of that appalling war.

Birdingbury Broadband Update

This update is not the end of the story, but merely a staging post so that we can gather further information to help everyone. Thank you for the replies and the additional information that many people provided.

A total of 67 completed usable replies was received. Data will be deleted once the analysis is complete and the special purpose email account also deleted as it has fulfilled its purpose. This is most likely to be at the end of September to allow for any further work.

The problem areas are unsurprisingly, Back Lane (especially around the lower end), the Wren Court grouping and some issues in the area of Master's Yard.

A draft set of the results and report was delivered to the Parish Council at the end of June for their consideration.

Reviewing the fibre rollout programme for the UK and specifically for this area, it is unlikely that the village will be prioritised for fibre to the premises (FTTP) i.e. fibre to your house. However, there are two other potential courses of action that are being followed up to provide better information for decision-making.

The first option is to find out from BT/Openreach whether is possible to replace the aluminium connections with copper. What is unknown at the moment is how extensive the aluminium problem is. Many people do not have information about the nature of their connection. This is held by BT/Openreach and may or may not be difficult to access, and given the focus on fibre, it is possible that this remedial "fix" is unavailable to us. This is already under investigation.

The second option is to look at the cost of fibre installation for everybody and then consider if there is grant or other money available to pay for it. This is a two-stage process, with an initial scoping exercise and with the matter then going to the Parish Council for further action. Along with another village, I am looking into its use within the bounds of the data protection legislation. Meanwhile, subject to the agreement of the Parish Council, I will post the full report on the village website.

Thank you again to everybody who took part and especially those who sent some additional information or shared it with me.

Back in Business

What's that about old dogs and new tricks? One centenarian realised there was no option but to "go virtual" if relationships were to be maintained when Covid-19 struck.



Rugby's Percival Guildhouse, Warwickshire's only independent adult education centre, was forced to close its doors in March when lockdown struck. In common with so many households, it embraced Zoom as a means of continuing to provide classes to its students. Thanks to the tireless efforts of its staff, the charity-run centre has run a variety of classes online during June and July.

No mean achievement for the 100-year-old centre which had hitherto only ever offered courses in person at its St Matthew's Street home.

Plans are now underway for the re-opening of the Guildhouse on 28 September, when more than 70 courses will be on offer, ranging from Italian, Spanish, French, German and Japanese language courses, to a good mix of arts and crafts. To safeguard students and ensure proper social distancing, most courses will be run on a 'blended' basis, with some places in-house and others joining virtually. Guildhouse Chairman, David Dove, says: 'The charity was set up a century ago to provide professional, tutor-led adult education to the local community. I'm proud we've kept doing that and very much look forward to welcoming folk back in September.'

My wounded love I see.




'Black Jake I'm gonna
