# **Birdingbury Parish Council Report**

The final Birdsong of the year and an excuse to look back: this time last year I wrote about listening to Bill read the names of the fallen and the Kohima Epitaph on Remembrance Sunday – he was remembered fondly at this year's service in church and, I'm sure, by the 70 or so who attended the ceremony at the War Memorial.

I also wrote in that edition about the approach that we had received from Landstrom about potential development of the Glebe Field. There have been no changes or contacts recently so the Parochial Church Council and Parish Council letters to the Diocese (the landowners) seem to have paid off. We will continue to monitor. The 5G mast proposal, by contrast, came and went very quickly as the formal application was refused by Rugby Borough Council. I like to believe this was also down to strong co-operation between the PC and villagers as the planners' reasons for refusal echoed points made by us and by several villagers who responded direct to RBC.

There has also been progress on two other fronts, with some running repairs on the Leam bridge by the track meaning that the bollards have been removed, and Highways have installed the safety barrier for the new pedestrian entrance into the Recreation Field. We are getting quotes for a pushchair and wheelchair accessible kissing gate, and we hope to have it installed before birds nest in the hedge! We are liaising with the PCC who own that part of the field.

There has still been no response from RBC regarding the lawful use application and the noise concerns relating to two business park units. We have escalated the delay to the Council's Chief Executive and our District Councillor, Emma Crane, is taking this up with the new Head of Planning. And in the last of the updates, a glimmer of movement from Openreach about fibre broadband, but we shall have to wait until the New Year to hear more, we think.

We discussed the Queen's Green Canopy for the Jubilee next year (see separate item) and have agreed to purchase two replacement trees for Main Street which will be our first 'Canopy' contribution in the New Year. We also discussed concerns about speeding cars and I'm grateful to Dick for attending November's meeting to share his experience. As a result, we are seeking a formal speed survey which will help us to create a case for signage or enforcement activity.

And from speeding to speedos ... Chris Morton has decided to stand down from the PC after what must be about 20 years on duty. Over the years he has brought his valuable property knowledge to the table, was always the first to volunteer to get his hands dirty, and has rarely sat on the fence on any topic (even when he should have!). The phrase 'one of a kind' was made for Cllr Morton. Thank you from me and from your fellow Councillors, Chris—we wish you and Jackie well with your move to the South-West.

On behalf of the Parish Council may I wish everyone a Merry Christmas and a happy and relaxing start to 2022.





The Parish Council has discussed whether the village would be interested in a collective tree planting activity as part of the Jubilee celebration in 2022. The Woodland Trust is supporting the official activity, known as The Queen's Green Canopy. They are providing free packs of saplings (from 15 to 420) and current orders would be delivered in March. A variety of species are available to plant either hedges or copses and any planting will need to be on publicly accessible land.

# Jammer Raises Cash For Charity...

Hello Birdingbury! Firstly, I'd like to say thanks for the opportunity to tell you my story and why I make preserves in aid of cancer charities.

Until 4 years ago, I'd rarely had a day's sickness in my life; I loved my job and was privileged to travel frequently to India and the USA. However, I didn't appreciate how much this all takes its toll until one day I woke up in India and looked in the mirror and thought 'What's that in the corner of my eye?' It was conjunctivitis, concerning but worse was yet to come. Fortunately, my colleague's wife was an eye doctor and was able to prescribe antibiotic drops, but she told me it could the sign of an underlying virus. She was right and that was the start of a battle from which it took nearly 2 years to recover. The virus attacked my digestive system and left me with extreme difficulty eating and unable to sleep more than 3 hours a night. The raised adrenaline levels also resulted in acute anxiety and PTSD symptoms.

But luckily for me help was out there in our wonderful community. The generous ladies of Marton gave up their time to help me get out walking and latterly to drive out for walks, or teas/chats. The preserve making all started with a quince tree in a local garden that had a bumper year and its fruit being offered to villagers. I'd never made quince jelly, but it worked out well, Since there was still plenty of fruit, I wondered if I could make and sell it for charity. This is

how I got involved with our village fundraising for cancer charities. In the first year I ended up making 116 jars of quince jelly which raised £400! My efforts have now grown to include other jellies, chutneys, jams and marmalades. Last year we raised £1270 in the sale of preserves, all of which went to Breast Cancer Now and Prostate Cancer UK charities. This year we're on target to reach £2000 from sales of preserves and refreshments at the Marton fundraising lunch.



I've been fully recovered now for 3 years and lucky to be back in a job I love, but I'll never forget that I wouldn't be here if it wasn't for the kindness of our local community. I can never repay them for the generosity in helping me back to health; making these preserves for the charities is my way of giving back.

I still have lots of stock available, so if anyone may be interested, I can be contacted on valerie\_a\_self@yahoo.co.uk for the full list and prices. 100% of the sales proceeds is donated to the charities.

Thanks very much to you all for taking the time to read my story. I hope I can tempt you to some tasty preserves and help support cancer research!

# **Nordic Walking**

Why are there so many people out walking with longer poles? Is it just something associated with lockdown exercise?

Nordic Walking (or walking with poles) is a specialised walking technique that exercises not just the legs, but also the upper body and the core. You need to learn how to do it, and how to adjust your poles, but this is not hard or expensive and poles can be borrowed to try before you buy.

As such it is a good workout for the whole body and it takes place in the open air. It can be used as pre-training for cross country skiing, but many Nordic Walkers just enjoy the walk. Of course, you can walk on your own or with a friend, but there are also different groups with different types of walks to meet your expectations and fitness level. These range from the slower, for those in recovery or with different needs as a result of health issues (or who just want a leisurely stroll), through the chatty walks (with or without poles), and onto the more 'hard-core' up hill and down dale across a country wide network of routes. There are also additional classes with yoga or other exercises and cardio workouts with poles on offer from some providers. There are even Zoom sessions and evening walks by torchlight.

There are several providers with websites that provide information, support and details of local classes. I have seen expensive courses that take place in lovely settings such as arboreta, and one-to-one private courses, but there are also much less expensive options that may suit most pockets. As an example, a three-mile walk lasting just over an hour may cost £7 to cover insurance, the walk leader, etc. Pole training can be arranged for around £12.50. Bundled deals bring the price down substantially!



A number of Birdingbury residents participate in various walking groups, or just go solo, so next time you see someone out, do ask if you are interested to know more. I have been Nordic walking since early August and it certainly does improve stamina, breathing and overall fitness - so it worked for me!
