Birdingbury Parish Council Report

Well, the Summer has certainly arrived! My son's weather station in our back garden recorded 39°C at 2:22pm on Tuesday 19 July, a figure that would have been a UK all-time record only 2 days before but was merely an outlier as other places rose into the 40s. I hope that your gardens survived better than my spuds in pots ... they were cooked before they were harvested!

I wrote about the Annual Village Meeting in the last Birdsong, and the decision to proceed with the surrender of the Birbury lease subject to various conditions being met. Work has started to firm up how the Club will take their side of this proposal forward. As leaseholders of the Birbury, the Parish Council has begun the process to obtain legal advice about the surrender. Inevitably this will all take time, but we're committed to keep the village updated as discussions progress.

As I've mentioned previously, the Parish Council maintains a list of various issues with roads around and within the village, and shares this regularly with the Highways team at Warwickshire County Council. Unfortunately, and maybe unsurprisingly in the current economic situation, we have been advised that there is very little budget left to undertake anything other than the most urgent repairs. We'll monitor the list of issues and raise them if they deteriorate. And we are still waiting to hear when the re-scheduled Leam bridge repairs and closure will take place.

As many of you will be aware, the long-awaited fibre broadband proposal suddenly came to life and I'd like to thank everyone who has registered their property. The infrastructure is funded by residents and businesses registering for services which unlocks vouchers to pay for the work. Whilst I know that some people haven't had issues with their broadband recently, registering for fibre will help the whole village upgrade their service and it will also future proof our services as tech and data demands grow in coming years. Thanks to Simon Kent and Sara Kendell for their co-ordinating efforts.

All is quiet on the planning front with no applications in recent months. This has allowed us some breathing space to review a range of Council policies, something that will run through to the end of the year. We will also be looking at the Parish Emergency Plan and aiming to reflect some of the lessons from the pandemic.

At the end of July, we have a Zoom call with Sustrans who manage the footpath on the old railway line. We have asked for an update on the proposed extension of the path towards Offchurch and what will happen to the land around the old bridge—I'll share anything of interest by the usual means and in the next Birdsong.

As we approach the holidays, I'd like to wish you a restful summer, whatever you have planned.



We're really excited to welcome the local Birdingbury community back to Bostock Sunflowers this summer! Following the success and enjoyment of last year, we're delighted to be opening our farm gates for a second Pick-Your-Own Sunflower season at Birdingbury Fields Farm.

This year we have an AMAZEing new addition – our Maize Maze! We'll be challenging visitors to complete the maze and to tick-off some friendly gnomes along the way during a treasure hunt!

We will also be joined by Josephine, serving up hot farm-reared food: sausages and burgers, as well as tea, coffee, and tubs of homemade Ringwood ice cream too.



We are opening on Thursday 21 July for at least two weeks from 10.30am to 7pm all week. Please check our Facebook page (Bostock Sunflowers) in case of any changes to opening times due to the weather!

The sunflower field is free to enter, and sunflowers cost £1 per stem. Entry to the maize maze is £3.00 per person, pre-schoolers and under are free, and children under age 16 are £1.00.

Please remember to bring secateurs and to wear sensible footwear. If you bring a dog, it must be kept on a lead. They are not allowed in either maze.

Commercial Vehicles of Yore

Following on from the recent articles highlighting model railways, I thought I would photograph some of my models which are of local interest. I'm sure many of our longer standing villagers will remember seeing some of these vehicles, or ones that were similar, in and around the area.

Midland Red Bus

This is a model of a Leyland Leopard K, therefore first registered between August 1971 and August 1972. It is typical of that period and was quite likely to have been seen in Birdingbury. In the Midland Red Leamington Spa Area timetable book for October 1964, Birdingbury was served by a total of 5 services.







ERF Flatbed Articulated Lorry

This is typical of a Rugby Cement orange lorry from the same era as the Midland Red Bus i.e., early 1970s. This one is carrying bags of cement. It could have been seen all over the country.



Nelson Cement Wagon

This was based on an actual rail wagon used by the Nelson cement works, as the old photo illustrates.





Rugby Cement Wagon

This too was based on an actual rail wagon, although I have no background information on this one.



Rugby Cement Presflow Wagon

This was designed in the 1950s for bulk transport of powdered product, particularly cement. The wagons were loaded by gravity and unloaded using compressed air. This vehicle would undoubtedly have come through Birdingbury from Southam Cement works on its way to Rugby for processing.
