

Remembrance Memories

Remembrance Sunday: a day to remember and honour those who were lost, and to be thankful for those who survived.

The day creates vivid memories for me as an important day in the calendar from my days as a chorister, with the Choir Master in his RAF uniform parading us to our war memorial, together with the flag carriers of the Royal British Legion, the Girls Friendly Society, the Scouts, Girl Guides and Church Lads Brigade. Since that time, I only recall having missed one church service on Remembrance Day, and that was when I was in London and so I went to the Cenotaph.

With a Grandfather, who lied about his age to fight on the Somme with the Durham Light Infantry, and a Father who joined the RAF at the age of 18 as a member of the Voluntary Reserve, this day has been one that I have always been able to contemplate with thanks that they came through, unlike those whom Bill Cowley remembers in his own inimitable style. This year, we were once again joined in church by Dr Peter Kent, the Headmaster of Lawrence Sheriff School. He joked about the efforts of his predecessor at the outbreak of war, establishing a platoon of the Home Guard and promoting himself to Colonel in Chief but who put everything into perspective when he reflected that of 400 boys in the school in 1939, 52 young lives had been lost by 1945.



But in addition to remembering the many men who lost their lives, this year's ceremony was also a time to reflect on the fact that it is 100 years since women were recruited into the services. I was reminded of my Grandfather's older sister, my Great Aunt Bertha.. On joining the Women's Auxiliary Army Corps, she was issued with 'coat, frock, 3 collars and 2 pairs of stockings'. How would we survive?

As we made our way into the Club for warm coffee on a cold, fresh day, it was good to be reminded that this service goes on, with Gaynor Davy resplendent with her Gulf War medal, and to remember her RAF service which culminated at RAF Wittering as a Corporal Flight Nursing Attendant.

We do owe so much to so many.

Birdingbury 100 years ago: Health and Medicine

Birdingbury residents were probably healthier than town populations due to clean air and access to fresh food. It was not a wealthy village however, and finding money to pay for a doctor to visit was probably a real worry in the days before the NHS.

Some doctors ran schemes whereby patients could pay a small sum each week for medical cover. This ensured a basic level of care for those who otherwise could not afford it, but was not very lucrative for doctors. Insurance schemes provided by insurance companies, employers, friendly societies or Trade Unions (known as 'sick clubs') also helped with the costs of medical care. If you could not afford any form of 'insurance', you might find yourself in a workhouse hospital. Under the National Insurance Act in 1911, GPs were paid the same rate of 2s (10p) for town and country (poor) patients. Access to a GP became free to male workers who were on low pay, but this didn't cover their wives or children, workers with a better standard of living or the retired. It worked through a 'panel' often operated by Friendly Societies who paid GPs as little as possible. GPs in affluent areas could rely on income from their patients. Poorer people, if they could not pay the small fee, had little right to care but sometimes obtained it through the GP's charity.

We know that at this time there were doctors based in Marton, Dunchurch and Southam; it is probable that these doctors would have visited and treated Birdingbury residents.

There was some interesting correspondence in the 1917 British Medical Journal from rural GPs complaining that, although there was less sickness in the countryside, their jobs were more difficult due to the distances they had to travel to visit patients. These GPs felt that they should be paid more to cover the cost of their petrol.

In 1901, life expectancy in England at birth was 48 for men, and 51.6 for women. This can be misleading, however, as the calculation is based on age at death in previous years. Infant mortality was high; in some areas one in four children died before their first birthday so this naturally brought the 'average' down. In other words, if you survived early childhood, you had a good chance of living well past the figures above. However, before antibiotics and the widespread availability of vaccinations (1920s), infectious diseases were the main cause of death and these could rapidly devastate families and whole communities.

The 'Spanish Flu' pandemic of 1918 was one of the greatest medical disasters of the 20th century. During the pandemic of 1918/19, over 50 million people died worldwide, and a quarter of the British population were affected. It appears that Birdingbury was fortunate: although there are no medical records available for this period, only three deaths occurred between 1918 and 1920 - two men aged 79, and a young man killed in the war.

If Birdingbury people needed hospital treatment, they would probably have been taken to Warneford Hospital in Leamington Spa. This hospital, on Radford Road, closed in 1993.

The VAD (Voluntary Aid Detachment) Red Cross Hospitals

These hospitals were established to provide care and convalescence for soldiers wounded in the First World War. The patients at these hospitals generally did not have life-threatening injuries but needed time to convalesce.



The War Office fixed and paid grants to hospitals for every patient they looked after, and the grant amount increased annually during the war. At the highest rate, the government paid £1 4s 6d (£1.23) per week, or £63 14s 0d (£63.70) per annum, for each patient. This covered full hospital treatment, food and other costs. Local doctors did a lot of voluntary work in these hospitals. In 1917 the War Office decided that some payment should be given to them for their efforts.

At a meeting in November 1916, John Akroyd (living at Birdingbury Hall) donated £100 towards the capital sum required to fund the Southam hospital. It was probably not a coincidence that Mrs Akroyd became deputy commandant of the hospital (the commandant oversaw the hospital, except for the medical and nursing services). The Akroyds' three sons were serving officers in the Army during the war. It is likely that some Birdingbury women volunteered to help at the hospital.

Southam VAD Hospital (The Grange, sometimes called the Springs, on Coventry Road)



The hospital had only two professional nurses, who were responsible for the medical care of the patients. They supervised the VAD 'nurses', who would wash and dress the patients, make beds, and provide basic care. Local doctors would give their time voluntarily, although were eventually paid by the government as the war dragged on.

Southam Hospital was one of 39 similar temporary hospitals in Warwickshire – this illustrates the scale of need for this level of care. Many more soldiers would have been in the military hospitals receiving more advanced treatment.

Dr Ernest Ormerod looked after the patients throughout the time the hospital was open. He also served surrounding villages using his car as a consulting room. It is very likely that Birdingbury was one of the villages he visited. Apparently, no one was ever turned away by Dr Ormerod, even if they were not able to pay.

Neighbourhood Watch

Over the last month or so there has been a most unusual and worrying spike in crime affecting Birdingbury. We have been subjected to:

- the theft of a car
- theft of tools from a van
- theft of a set of ladders
- smash and grab of valuables from a car
- attempted night time burglary
- and, most worrying, the day time burglary of a house on the Stockton Road.



The police are working very hard to try to identify and apprehend the individuals responsible.

I think it is important to know that we are not the only village being targeted. Marton has also suffered from several burglaries, along with Long Itchington.

The NHW alert system works very simply. As soon as I am made aware of an incident, or I have any information to feedback, I circulate it, by email, to all the addresses I hold for that purpose (currently 115). If you are not on that circulation list, please let me know and I will be happy to include you.

The information is also shared with neighbouring NHW co-ordinators. I believe the most valuable thing about this for us in Birdingbury is knowing very quickly what has happened/is happening: not only to be wary for our own sakes but also to have the opportunity to help with information feedback in a really timely manner.



People play a valuable role in information gathering. Therefore, please do let me know as soon as possible about any problems you have experienced or suspicious activity you may spot. Small details often link together and help provide the police with valuable intelligence that builds into a wider picture.

I have been asked by the police to thank all our residents whose information is helping them with investigations. I will myself add a thank you because it makes the job of circulating it worthwhile too!




