Birdingbury Parish Council Report

I can't believe that we've reached the June/July Birdsong already ... where has the first half of the year gone?

Most of this update is going to be saying 'Thank You'. The Parish Council started its new four-year cycle in May, and we said goodbye and thank you to Rich Cutts for his contribution over recent years. And we said hello and thank you for volunteering to Carmel de Nahlik, who we have co-opted to fill the vacant Councillor seat.

Thank you to the village residents who came to the Annual Village Meeting earlier in May. We discussed the Birbury lease, and I gave a brief update of the past Council year. And thank you to those who gave updates on various village organisations, including the newly established Community Café. The economic situation and changing demographics mean that some groups have changed or face particular challenges, but it is great to be reminded that 'community' is created when people make connections with each other (generally over cake, it appears).

And thank you to everyone who put their name down on our Big Help Out board during the 'Coronation Community Café', boosting our bands of bakers, servers, painters and litter pickers. If anyone missed the board and would like to get involved, please let me know.

We won't be thanking Highways who have finally given us a quote for a strip of curb on a muddy stretch of Main Street. The cost would take all the PC's financial reserves, so we are now exploring grants and co-funding options with Rugby Borough Council and Warwickshire County Council. Parking was raised at the Annual Village Meeting as a continuing issue for some, particularly roadside parking opposite driveways which can make exits quite tight. Thanks to everyone who has been flexible recently about how they park so that we can keep our roads and pavements clear.

At May's meeting we also discussed our approach to planning applications. We have some brief rules that guide how we act as a Council when planning matters come up, so we reviewed whether these needed to be updated. We will continue to look at every application on its merits and our role is to provide a local view to the Planning team that make the decisions. Planning applications are public documents, and anyone can view them at <u>www.planning.agileapplications.co.uk/rugby</u> (put Birdingbury in the search bar).

Finally, I'd just like to wish the various children in the village who have exams currently, especially GCSEs and A Levels ... the best of luck. Soon be over and then summer beckons!

Val's Model Legacy

Following Val's eulogy which highlighted her involvement in railway modelling, I was asked to divulge a bit more, so here goes.

My introduction started with a train set for Christmas and my fifth birthday and I was hooked. This passion kept up all through my school years and I teamed up with Wilf Chippendale and we would go off to various exhibitions together.

It was after one exhibition in 1994 at the Learnington Spa Centre that I saw that the Learnington and Warwick model railway club were having an open day, so I thought I'd go along to see what would happen.

There a group of chaps had just started to build a new layout, so I joined in and that was the birth of 'Clarendon': a layout set in London in 1908. Since then, we have taken the layout all over the UK from Penzance to Newcastle and beyond.

In 2010 we were invited to exhibit at a show in Houton, Holland. That meant I had to get a passport... but it was a very enjoyable, long weekend.

It was around this time when we all thought that Clarendon was finished, and thoughts turned to what next. In the end we decided to extend the layout rather than build a new one, so we set to.



Well, we never rush these things so when Val retired in 2015 and she came along to see what I got up to on a Thursday evening, there was still plenty to do. We put a paint brush in her hand and told her the new trackwork needed painting and that was her introduction to railway modelling.

Now to explain a bit more about Clarendon: it is built in 4mm scale to P4 standards, that means the track is to correct scale and therefore needs to be hand built, as is almost everything else on the layout.

Once the track was finished, we needed a coal yard, so that meant more painting for Val, including buildings, cobbled yards, fencing, horse and carts, and people.

She also made up a horse paddock with trees and hedges.



Another recent job I had was to replace the existing turntable with a larger one. This was also hand built from a kit, including a motor and some electronics to get it to turn and stop in the correct place. It then needed mounting in the baseboard and the track realigning.

Finally, the groundwork needed repairing and matching to the existing format - more painting for Val.

The last job we started was to infill a cobbled road between the sidings in the goods yard, but now I shall

have to finish that by myself.

For anyone wanting a closer look we are having an open day on Saturday 17 June from 10am till 4pm. We will be running trains on Clarendon and the other club layouts. There will also be trains running on the newly opened outdoor track.



Draycote Meadows



Just a short walk along the disused railway track lies Draycote Meadows, a Warwickshire Wildlife site of special scientific interest (OS map reference SP 44862 70612).

These picturesque traditional hay meadows are a great example of remaining unimproved grassland found in Warwickshire today. There are hints of the meadow's ancient origins and you can spot the ridge and furrow markings. They are managed traditionally as hay meadows, cut in late July and then grazed by cattle in the autumn.

Here you can enjoy waves of buttercup, cowslip, meadow vetchling and yellow rattle. Twenty species of grass are interspersed with bursts of colourful flower spikes. The southern meadow contains a wide range of plants including the inconspicuous adder's tongue fern.

Both meadows are renowned for spectacular displays of green-winged orchid, indicating the undisturbed antiquity of the site. Even rare moonwort is recorded in this meadow, its only known location in Warwickshire. Butterflies are abundant, with small copper and common blue dancing across the meadows and along the hedgerows. In autumn, fungi forays will reward you with an amazing list of fungi, with an impressive dozen species of waxcap alone. Other distinctive fungi include white and smokey spindles, and the meadow coral.



The stream is fed by spring-water helping brooklime, lesser water-parsnip and meadowsweet thrive on its margins. The hedgerows contain English elm, blackthorn and wild privet mingled with ivy and dog-rose. Occasional specimens of oak, ash and wild cherry add further diversity. A good range of birds nest and roost in the trees and hedgerow, including nuthatch, great spotted and green woodpeckers. Redwing and fieldfare relish the reserve in winter months.

The site is 14 hectares with a small parking are in front of the entrance gate. Visitors are asked to stay on the footpaths to avoid damaging the rare flowers, and to keep dogs on leads.
